At high noon, as Miss Dorothy Tuttle played the strains from Lohengrin's wedding march, the bridal couple took their place before an improvised altar of cut flowers. The ring ceremony was performed by Rev. R. K. Sutton. The bride was beautifully gowned in pink chiffon, ankle length, with pink satin slippers and carried a bouquet of bridal roses and baby breath. She also wore a strand of white crystal beads, the gift of the groom. The attendants were Mr. and Mrs. Emmett Hayes. Mrs. Hayes is a sister of the bride. She wore a yellow organdy, floor length, with green satin sash, and green morre slippers.
